Each day Leacock programs inspire youth, in Canada and South Africa, to overcome barriers, unlock their potential and contribute to their communities. We support children who are born into challenging economic circumstances by providing a fully-subsidized platform of literacy and leadership programs. These programs ignite, accelerate and provide a bridge to academic and personal success.

In Toronto our programs touch 1300 young people and in South Africa, through our partnership with the Get Ahead Project Schools, we reach 1400 students. Along with 300 volunteers who support our programs through peer mentorships, Leacock programs touch the lives of 3000 young people, creating opportunities for potential to develop and flourish.



Toronto

Locally in Toronto, programs are offered in collaboration with partner schools in several high-needs communities including St. James Town, Keele - Finch, Woburn, Scarborough and the First Nations School of Toronto. We have mutually beneficial

partnerships with the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority, Future Design School, Rotman School of Management, OISE, Branksome Hall, and Greenwood College.



In South Africa, we work with the Get Ahead Schools trio of low-fee independent schools in Queenstown — a rural community in the Eastern Cape near Nelson Mandela's birthplace. Our donors support these schools through infrastructure, technology updates, teacher development and student-leadership programs.





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A MESSAGE FROM PETER OLIVER





LEAP INTO LITERACY

Igniting the Spark


LEAP into Literacy Summer Day Camp is a full-day, fully-subsidized, four week program offered during the month of July in our three designated communities. Students who attend the camp have been recommended to the program by their classroom teacher and spend the day working on their reading, writing and communication skills while also enjoying experiential activities like art, yoga, sports, and various field trips.

In order to ensure that the program was fulfilling its core objectives, in the summer of 2017 the Leacock Foundation commissioned an independent and full program assessment.


Findings were gathered from a sample of 215 Grade 1-5 students through pre and post benchmark tests as well as pre- and post -attitude surveys. We are thrilled to share the results with you so that you can see how your donations are having an impact on this vulnerable population.



In less than one month, students showed a 5% point increase in their reading skills




Students' attitudes towards reading improved along with their abilities



Significantly, students agreeing with the phrase "I am a good reader" went up by **11% points** in less than 1 month.




Over the course of camp, students demonstrated a 10% point increase in their writing skills




The aspect of writing that students improved on the most was in how they **organized** their ideas.

Students' positive attitudes towards writing also increased



Students **agreeing** with the phrase "I am a good writer" went up by **9% points** to 78%, or almost **4 in 5**.

On balance, girls showed gains in their leadership abilities, and boys increased their positivity toward group work



STEAMING AHEAD



STEAM education — an approach to learning shared by the global teaching community — is gaining popularity all over the world. In 2017, our funding to the Get Ahead School in South Africa was focused on enhancing the learning experience in the classroom for children through the integration of science, Technology, English/Engineering/Entrepreneurship, Arts and Math.

In the STEAM classroom, student lessons are dynamic, hands on, inquiry-based and designed to develop the skills needed to thrive in a rapidly-changing world. Both students and teachers at the Get Ahead School see the value of this world-class approach to learning as occupations in STE³AM-related careers are some

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of the fastest growing and best paid of the 21st century, and they often have the greatest potential for job growth.

The teachers share:

"In each classroom there are so many different types of learners. With STE³AM, we're reaching all the children."

"The students' self-discipline has improved. They challenge themselves more. Grades are markedly improving across the board."

ACCELERATING STUDENT POTENTIAL

Meet Thando Hintsa

Donations to the Leacock Foundation support critical staff at the school such as Thandokazi Hintsa, the School Counselor. Ms. Hintsa started in January 2017 and is a qualified Registered Counsellor and holds a BPsych degree. She is a member of the Health Professions Council of South Africa (HPCSA) and the Psychological Society of South Africa (PSYSSA).

At Get Ahead, she has been offering short term counselling services as the resident guidance counsellor, to learners across all three schools. Working on eliminating the stigma associated with counselling, she navigates this area with much sensitivity. Her approach centres on student advocacy and ensuring equitable access to instructional programs and activities.

Ms. Hintsa offers personal development workshops with the teachers once a month; collaborates with the school curriculum through Life Orientation, addresses challenges with the youth; works to increase parental involvement through term meetings with parents of sponsored students and targets Grade 9's and Grade 12's in career avenues, focusing on subject choices with the Grade 9's and study opportunities with the Grade 12's. She also maintains close links with professionals to assist learners with learning barriers.

Meet SanahGrade 6 Student, Rose Avenue
Junior Public School

Sanah is an Afghani-Canadian 6th grade student at Rose Avenue Junior Public School. As a long-time Leacock learner, she has attended a number of Leacock

programs over the years including Saturday Morning Club, JUMP Math, and LEAP into Literacy Summer Day Camp. For Sanah, her Leacock experience has been a memorable one and only the beginning of her learning journey. Sanah was always a very shy student in her Rose Avenue classroom but Sanah's teachers saw her potential and encouraged her to enroll in LEAP into Literacy Summer Day Camp. She benefited from the literacy camp activities, which included a small group setting to reinforce reading, writing, and oral communication skills. The balance of both academic and experiential learning has helped Sanah return to her classroom with increased academic and social confidence.

"I enjoy the Leacock programs because the teachers make it fun. I like to make goals. The teacher always makes it fun, like if you read books you get ice cream. I'm getting better at my handwriting and math. Math club really helped, I enjoyed it. I usually have been so shy to ask questions and raise my hand up. I always keep it down and ask the person beside me. Now that I'm in LEAP they always encourage us and tell us to don't be shy."



Meet lan Grade 6 Student, Saturday Morning Club, Woburn

"My favourite thing about going to Saturday Morning Club is seeing my friends on the weekend. We all get together and enjoy a lot of fun activities."

lan is in Grade 6 and regularly attends Saturday Morning Club at Woburn Junior Public School. He also participated in the overnight Leacock LEADership Camp in the summer of 2016. At the start of school in September, he was quiet and reserved. His teachers wanted him to be more vocal during class discussions, so group activities were encouraged in which he would show more of a leadership role. With gentle encouragement, lan embraced the role of group leader by motivating his peers and leading by example to go above and beyond in the creation of their presentation. Ian was able to overcome his fear, and demonstrate his leadership capabilities in a safe, nurturing environment. Ian plans to attend LEADership Camp again this summer where he will continue to develop his leadership skills.

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Meet Thando Grade 7 Student, Queenstown Get Ahead Project Mrs Griffin's Class

Thando lives with his Granny, Gladys, after his Mom passed away three years ago. With little family support and struggling to

survive on his Granny's pension, Thando's education is paid for through the Leacock sponsorship program.

Margaret Whewall, a beloved member of the Leacock and Get Ahead family, has been Thando's sponsor since 2013.

She shares:

"Thando is a kind and caring boy who is full of personality. I am so proud of his hard work and perseverance with his studies at Q-GAP!"

Thando has grown into a confident young man and this year, he had the starring role in the school concert, INKUMBULU, Under the Get Ahead Skies where his charm and charisma stole the show!



Meet Nikita Grade 6 Student, Queenstown Get Ahead Project

Nikita lives with her Dad, Mom, older sister and brother. In her own words, "We live happily!".

LEAD THROUGH TRAILS

Building Tomorrow's Leaders

LEAD Through Trails

Learn. Lead. Take Action! is the theme of this three-phase environmental-leaders-of-tomorrow program. In partnership with Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) the Leacock Foundation provides an innovative learning experience for students in Grade 5 who attend First Nations School of Toronto and for students in Grades 5 and 6 who attend Woburn Junior Public School. Through in-class science-based programming, followed by outdoor recreation and team-building activities, students learn to make important connections with nature and develop the skills needed to lead and take action in their homes, schools and communities. By the program's completion, students have not only considered their own behaviours and the impacts of their choices, but have been inspired to take action by making a personal pledge to improve their habits, reduce their ecofootprint and help the environment.

During 2017, student participants decreased their ecological footprint by 19%. In addition 93% of teachers indicated that student awareness of environmental issues increased and 89% of teachers indicated that students' willingness to mentor others about environmental concerns increased.


The program is supported by six eager Grade 11 student volunteers from Greenwood College who raised their hands to mentor the Grade 5 students in this program. The students have travelled to each school to lead activities with the students prior to the outdoor

field trips to Kortright Field Centre and Tommy Thompson Park. They have also participated in the all-day outdoor field trips providing mentorship, leadership and oodles of enthusiasm and fun for the younger students.

The Get Ahead Concert

In celebration of 25 years of growth and development at GAP, students across all grade levels put on an amazing play detailing the life of a GAP student from preschool to Grade 12. This school-wide collaboration highlighted a student's journey through the years and included elements of STEAM — the "time machine" built by students as well as classroom scenes. which depicted science experiments. A common thread of song and dance ensured that the audience was well entertained. Besides the sold-out performances and community support, we are the most proud of the schools for their teamwork, dedication, and professionalism which came together to ensure a very successful performance. Students embodied the spirit of Get Ahead effortlessly and their performance will be remembered for many years to come.

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Meet Kate Rochon Branksome Hall

Each year a group of high school students from Branksome Hall travel to South Africa to visit the Get Ahead School in South Africa as part of the "Triangle of Hope – Sister Circles Program." During

the trip the students learn about South Africa and meet their GAP "Sister," becoming global citizens along the way. For Kate Rochon, this trip would provide the motivation to make a difference in a

community far from home.

While in South Africa, Kate visited the Isibindi Safe Park — a park located in the Eastern Cape, which helps support families who have been affected by HIV/AIDS. Isibindi Safe Park works with the children who are most vulnerable and need the most care. While visiting the Safe Park, Kate became aware that the community does not have any access to clean water or sanitation services.

"With the drought in South Africa this project has never been more important. I have now made it my goal to bring clean water and sanitation services to Isibindi."

Kate was inspired to make a difference, and when she returned home began to raise money and awareness of the project. To date she has raised over \$2,000 and construction at Isibindi will begin shortly.





HAVING FUN AND GIVING BACK

The Leacock Foundation was built on the premise that you can have a good time while doing good. Each year the Foundation hosts two signature fundraising events: the Leacock Debate and the YPL's Lawn Night.



2017 Leacock Debate

In April 2017, over 375 people attended the 18th Annual Leacock Debate raising \$200,000 in support of Leacock LEADership Summer Overnight Camp. LEADERship Camp was launched in 2015 in partnership with the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority. This program has already reached over 360 youth from some of Toronto's most underserved communities. For children involved in Leacock programming, this week-long stay outside the city is a life-changing experience where they develop greater self-confidence and leadership skills. We sincerely thank our guests, sponsors, planning committee and debaters, for your commitment and support which allow us to continue this exciting opportunity for youth.



2017 Leacock Lawn Night

In June 2017, the Young Professionals of Leacock (YPL) hosted 100 guests at the 3rd Annual Leacock Lawn Night. Bowlers faced off in a team-based lawn bowling tournament raising over \$10,000.00. We are grateful to the YPL Event Committee, enthusiastic participants and sponsors who made the event a success! Together, we were able to send over 40 students from the Keele/Finch community to Norval Outdoor Education Centre. The children enjoyed challenging themselves on the high ropes courses, which was a summer highlight for many of our campers! Funds raised also helped to sponsor the school fees of Robshack, Fikile, Owami and Bagcine for an entire year. Thanks to your generosity, these students attending the Get Ahead Schools in Queenstown, SA will continue to have access to a quality education.
